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NOTICE TO CANDIDATES & COMMITTEES

This candidate guide is a reference for candidates seeking to be nominated or elected at the June 8, 2010 Primary Election and November 2, 2010 General Election. This guide provides general information for candidates, political committees, and anyone interested in elective office. It is intended to be a resource and is not legally sufficient. In case of conflict, the law, regulation or rule will apply.

Proof of qualifications may be required for some offices. Please refer to the appropriate office information page in this guide or contact the Elections Office or the Secretary of State's office. No duty is imposed upon the Registrar of Voters to determine whether a candidate meets the requirements for holding office or if the submitted qualification documents are authentic. The Declaration of Candidacy, which each candidate must sign under penalty of perjury, states that the candidate meets the statutory and/or constitutional qualifications for office (including, but not limited to, citizenship, residency, etc.).

While staff has attempted to be as informative as possible in compiling this information, and we appreciate the opportunity to address your questions not answered in this handbook, the law prohibits employees from answering questions of a legal nature. This handbook is not intended as a substitute for legal counsel. For your protection, we strongly urge you to consult an attorney.

All code references are to the California Elections Code unless stated otherwise.

A separate candidate's guide will be issued in June 2010 for special and school district offices appearing only on the November 2, 2010 ballot

The Santa Barbara County Elections Division is not an enforcement agency and is therefore unable to investigate any violations. When our office receives reports of violations, we refer the person reporting the violation to one of the following agencies:

Fair Political Practices Commission at <u>www.fppc.ca.gov</u>, (800) 561-1861 for violations of the Political Reform Act, i.e. mass mailing requirements; slate mailers; campaign disclosure; proper use of campaign funds; and disclosure of economic interests.

California Secretary of State at <u>www.sos.ca.gov</u>, (916) 657-2166 or the local District Attorney at (805) 568-2300 for election fraud.

California State Attorney General at www.caag.state.ca.us, (800) 952-5225 or the local District Attorney at (805) 568-2300 for open meeting laws, unlawful use of public funds, violations of the California Elections Code, the Penal Code, or any laws other than those governed by the Political Reform Act.

Federal Election Commission at <u>www.fec.gov</u>, (800) 424-9530 for federal campaign, i.e., Congressional, U.S. Senate, and President of the United States.

Local City Attorney at (805) 564-5326 or local District Attorney at (805) 568-2300 for enforcement of local ordinances, vandalism, or requirements concerning campaign signs.

Violations of the Political Reform Act (Title 9 of CA Gov. There is no agency enforcement to deal with <u>false or misleading campaign materials</u>. These issues should be handled through the local court system.

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SECTION 2

QUALIFICATIONS

GENERAL QUALIFICATIONS TO RUN FOR AND HOLD PUBLIC

A person is incapable of holding a civil office if at the time of his/her election or appointment he/she is not 18 years of age and a citizen of the state.

§1020 G.C.

A person is not eligible to a county or district office, unless he or she is a registered voter of the county or district in which the duties of the office are to be exercised at the time that nomination papers are issued to the person...

§ 24001 G.C.

Unless otherwise specifically provided, no person is eligible to be elected or appointed to an elective office unless that person is a registered voter and otherwise qualified to vote for that office at the time that nomination papers are issued to the person or at the time of the person's appointment.

§ 201

A person is disqualified from holding any office upon conviction of designated crimes as specified in the Constitution and laws of the State.

PETITION IN LIEU OF FILING FEE

§§ 106, 333, 8020, 8025, 8040 8041, 8060 - 8069, 8106

Beginning Monday, January 4, 2010 and ending Thursday, February 25, 2010, a candidate for any office may obtain his or her forms from the County Elections Official for circulating petitions to secure signatures inlieu of all or part of the filing fee. Signatures may also be applied to the signature requirements for the office on the nomination paper (for partisan candidates the signers must be of the same party as the candidate). The County Elections Official shall furnish to each candidate, or his/her authorized representative, upon request and without charge, forms for securing signatures. If more than fifty forms are required, the Elections Official may provide the candidate with a master form, which may be duplicated by the candidate at his/her expense. Only forms furnished by the County Elections Official shall be used to secure signatures.

§§ 8061, 8106

For the number of signatures required, refer to the pages of this guide for specific local offices. For State and Federal offices, refer to the qualification pages created by the Secretary of State's office.

Any voter may sign an in-lieu-filing-fee petition for any candidate for whom he or she is eligible to vote.

§ 8106(b)(1)

The signatures submitted may cover all, or a prorated portion, of the filing fee, however, candidates using Elections Code § 8106(a) (6) provisions are limited to signatures from members of their own parties.

§ 8106

If a voter signs more candidates' petitions than there are offices to be filled, the voter's signatures shall be valid only on those petitions which, taken in the order they were filed, do not exceed the number of offices to be filled.

§ 8106(b)(2)

Sections of in-lieu-filing-fee petitions shall be filed with the county elections official of the <u>county in which the signers reside</u>.

8106(b)

A candidate who submits a petition in lieu of filing fee may request that the County Elections Official count all valid signatures appearing on the petition toward the number of sponsor signatures required for the candidate's nomination paper provided the signers are registrants of the same party as the candidate. If the in-lieu-filing fee petition contains the requisite number of valid signatures required for the nomination papers, the candidate is not required to circulate and file nomination papers, but may request the County Elections Official to accept the in-lieu-filing-fee petition as nomination papers. If the in-lieu-filing-fee petition does not contain the requisite number of valid signatures required for the nomination papers, the candidate may still circulate and file nomination papers to be signed by qualified registered voters of his/her party during the nomination period. The candidate may request the County Elections Official to apply the number of valid signatures on the in-lieu-filing-fee petition toward, and combine them with, the valid number of signatures on the nomination papers to satisfy the signature requirement for the office. The

nomination papers shall be delivered to the County Elections Official of the county in which the signer resides and is a voter.

§§ 8061, 8063, 8106

Within 10 days after receipt of the petition, the county elections official shall notify the candidate of any deficiency. The candidate shall then, prior to March 12, 2010, either submit a supplemental petition containing additional signatures or pay a pro rata portion of the filing fee to cover the deficiency.

§ 8106(b)(3)

The County Elections Official will not accept for filing any petition in lieu of filing fee or nomination paper unless all blanks therein are filled, and he will mark as "Not Sufficient" any signature that does not appear in the same handwriting as appears on the affidavit of registration in his office or in which the declaration of party affiliation is not in accordance with the declaration of party affiliation on such affidavit of registration.

§§ 8065, 8081

The last day to submit the petitions in lieu of filing fee to the County Elections Official of **the county in which the signatures were gathered** is **February 25**, **2010**. No additional signatures may be filed after the filing date, but supplemental signatures may be filed to replace signatures in the original filing that were found to be invalid. That portion of the filing fee not covered by the signatures must be paid in full before the nomination documents may be filed. The County Elections Official, within ten days after receipt of petitions, must notify the candidate of any deficiency. Candidates must then, prior to close of the nomination period, either submit a supplemental petition or pay the pro rata portion of the filing fee.

§§ 8061, 8105, 8106

NOTE: All candidates <u>must still file a Declaration of Candidacy</u> between February 16 and March 12, 2010 <u>even if the petitions in lieu contain a sufficient number of signatures to count toward the nomination signatures.</u>

CIRCULATORS

A candidate may circulate and obtain signatures for his/her own petition in lieu of filing fee or he/she may appoint one or more circulators to secure signatures.

Each circulator of an in-lieu-filing-fee petition shall be a registered California voter. The circulator shall serve within the county in which he or she resides. § 8106(b)(4)

A circulator appointed by a candidate shall be a voter in the district or political subdivision in which the candidate is to be voted on and shall serve only in that district or political subdivision. (There is no requirement to file an Appointment of Circulator form). The circulator shall serve within the county in which he/she resides. The circulator is not required to be a registered voter in the same party as the candidate, if applicable.

§§ 8066, 8106(b) (4)

A circulator may also be a signer on the petition he/she is circulating, if otherwise qualified.

Any number of qualified people may circulate petitions for a candidate, however, each form may have only one circulator, as the person must sign that he/she witnessed all signatures on the form.

<u>WARNING</u>: Every person acting on behalf of a candidate is guilty of a misdemeanor who deliberately fails to file at the proper time and in the proper place any nomination paper in his or her possession which is entitled to be filed under Section 18202 of the Elections Code.

§ 8041

SIGNERS

Any registered voter may sign an in-lieu-filing-fee petition for any candidate for whom he or she is eligible to vote; however, candidates filing signatures-in-lieu pursuant to the provisions of § 8106(a)(6) are limited to members of their own party.

No more signers shall be secured for any candidate than the maximum number required in this article. If, however, through miscalculation or otherwise, more signers are secured than the maximum number, the officer with whom the nomination papers are filed shall, with the written consent of the candidate, withdraw the excess number. § 8067

For Democratic and Republican candidates, any registered voter may sign an in-lieu-filing-fee petition for any candidate for whom he or she is eligible to vote. This means that a signer must be a registered voter in the district or political subdivision in which the candidate is to be voted on. (Partisan candidates who wish to apply Petition in Lieu signatures to their nomination signature requirement must obtain these signatures from members of their own parties.)

For candidates from other qualified parties that are using the provisions of Elections Code 8106(a) (6), signers of an in-lieu-fee petition must be affiliated with the party in which the nomination is proposed.

§§ 1066, 8106, 8068

Declined to State Voters

Declined to State voters may sign the petition of any partisan candidate whose party has notified the Secretary of State that it has adopted a rule allowing such registrants to vote their party's ballot at the ensuing Primary Election. **This information will not be available until after February 3, 2010** when the Secretary of State issues the notice of qualified political parties.

A voter may sign both a candidate's nomination papers and his or her in lieu filing fee petition. However, if signatures appearing on such documents are counted towards both the nomination paper and the in lieu filing fee petition signature requirements, a person may only sign one of the documents.

§§ 8061 & 8106(a) (7)

If the office is <u>nonpartisan</u>, any registered voter within the district or political subdivision in which the candidate is to be voted on is eligible to sign the petition.

If a voter signs more candidates' petitions than there are offices to be filled, the voter's signatures shall be valid only on those petitions which, taken in the order they were filed, do not exceed the number of offices to be filled.

§ 8106(b) (2)

<u>All signers of the same section of a petition must be registered in one county.</u> Different sections must be used in each county where the petitions are circulated and then filed with the County Elections Official in the affected county. "...The nomination papers, properly assembled, may be fastened together by counties, but in no case shall nomination papers signed by voters of different counties be fastened together."

§ 8501

No more signers shall be secured for any candidate than the maximum number required. If, however, through miscalculation or otherwise, more signers are secured than the maximum number, the officer with whom the nomination papers are filed shall, with the written consent of the candidate, withdraw the excess number.

§ 8067

If the number of signatures affixed to an in-lieu filing fee petition filed pursuant to Section 8106 is 100 or more, the County Elections Official may use a random sampling technique for verification of the signatures. Upon completion of the verification of signatures in the sample, the percentage of signatures which are valid shall be applied and projected to the total number of signatures submitted. See § 8084 for more information regarding the number of signatures over 100 but less than 2000, etc.

§ 8084

Each voter must sign his/her name in the presence of the circulator and legibly print in the place of residence, giving street and residence number, if any. It is important that the signer, himself/herself, write in the above requirements. Signers are cautioned to give their <u>residence</u> and not their business or mailing address. The circulator must swear to the affidavit appearing at the end of each section of the nomination paper and return all sections to the candidate, who will arrange for filing with the County Elections Official for examination and certification.

§§ 8041, 8063, 8500

DECLARATION OF INTENTION FOR JUDICIAL CANDIDATE - February 1 through February 10, 2010

Every candidate for a judicial office (except judicial offices filled in accordance with subdivision (d) of Section 16 of Article VI of the Constitution), shall file a Declaration of Intention written and signed of his or her intention to be a candidate for that office on a form to be supplied by the elections official, not more than 14 nor less than five days prior to the first day which his or her nomination papers may be circulated and signed or may be presented for filing. The filing fee must be paid when the Declaration of Intention is filed.

§ 8023, 8105 (b)

No candidate for a judicial office shall be required to state his or her residential address on the declaration of intention. However, if the address is not stated on the declaration of intention, the address must be provided to the elections official for verification. § 8023 ©

NOMINATION DOCUMENTS

- Prospective candidates for the coming election should obtain the necessary forms from the County Elections Official as soon as possible on or after the first day to circulate and file, and they should file the papers as soon as completed so that any irregularities may be corrected before the last filing date. If the papers are found "Not Sufficient," no additions or corrections may be made after 5:00 p.m., March 12, 2010, or in the event of an extension, 5:00 p.m., March 17, 2010
- All candidates for offices at the Primary Election must file a Declaration of Candidacy and Nomination Papers with the County Elections Official, who shall provide the forms free of charge.
- No person may file nomination papers for more than one office at the same election.
- A candidate shall not remove a Declaration of Candidacy form from the office of the Elections Official.
- The Elections Official shall require all candidates filing a Declaration of Candidacy to execute the declaration in the Elections Office. However, a candidate may submit a signed and dated written statement designating a person to receive a Declaration of Candidacy form from the County Elections Official for the candidate. This statement shall include language explaining that the candidate is aware that the Declaration of Candidacy must be properly executed and delivered to the County Elections Official of the County of the candidate's residence by 5:00 p.m. on March 12, 2010.
- No candidate's name shall be printed on the ballot to be used at the Primary Election unless he/she files a <u>Declaration of Candidacy</u> pursuant to Section 8040 of the Elections Code, and <u>Nomination Papers</u> signed by signers pursuant to Section 8041 of the Elections Code.
- All Nomination Documents must be delivered to the office of the County Elections Official between February 16, 2010 and by 5:00 p.m., on March 12, 2010, unless all eligible incumbents have not filed, in which case the filing period shall be extended to 5:00 p.m., March 17, 2010.

§§ 8003, 8020, 8028, 8101

 The office of the County Elections Official will close promptly at 5:00 p.m. on the closing date after which no further nomination documents will be accepted.

§§ 8020 & 8082

• The County Elections Official shall forward all nomination documents to the Secretary of State for filing within five days after being left with the County Elections Official.

§ 8082

No Declaration of Candidacy for a partisan office shall be filed by the candidate unless:

- (a) at the time of presentation of the declaration and continuously for not less than three (3) months immediately prior to that time, the candidate is shown by his/her affidavit of registration to be affiliated with the political party the nomination of which he/she seeks, and
- (b) the candidate has not been registered as affiliated with a qualified political party other than that political party the nomination of which he/she seeks within **twelve (12) months** immediately prior to the filing of the declaration.

§8001(a)

The County Elections Official shall attach a certificate to the Declaration of Candidacy showing the date on which the candidate registered as intending to affiliate with the political party the nomination of which he/she seeks and indicating that the candidate has not been affiliated with any other qualified political party for the 12

month period immediately preceding the filing of the declaration. This section shall not apply to candidates of political parties participating in their first direct Primary Election after their qualification as political parties.

§ 8001(b)

"Party" means a political organization that has qualified for participation in any Primary Election. The parties qualified to participate in the June 8, 2010 Primary Election at the time this document was published are: (1) Democratic, (2) Republican, (3) American Independent, (4) Green, (5) Libertarian, and (6) Peace and Freedom.

§ 338

No candidate who's Declaration of Candidacy has been filed for the Primary Election may withdraw as a candidate for that election.

§ 8800

Filing Fees

All filing fees are due when the nomination documents are issued. U.S. Congressional and State Office filing fees are to be made payable to the Secretary of State. All other filing fees are to be made payable to the Registrar of Voters. All filing fees are nonrefundable, even in the event that the candidate fails to qualify as a candidate. Only forms issued by the County Elections Official may be used.

§§ 8101, 8105 & 8106

CIRCULATORS

A candidate may circulate and obtain signatures for his/her own petition in lieu of filing fee or he/she may appoint one or more circulators to secure signatures.

§§ 106, 8066

Each circulator of an in-lieu-filing-fee petition shall be a registered California voter. The circulator shall serve within the county in which he or she resides. § 8106(b)(4)

A circulator appointed by a candidate shall be a voter in the district or political subdivision in which the candidate is to be voted on and shall serve only in that district or political subdivision. (There is no requirement to file an Appointment of Circulator form). The circulator shall serve within the county in which he/she resides. The circulator is not required to be a registered voter in the same party as the candidate, if applicable.

§§ 8066, 8106(b) (4)

A circulator may also be a signer on the petition he/she is circulating, if otherwise qualified.

Any number of qualified people may circulate petitions for a candidate, however, each form may have only one circulator, as the person must sign that he/she witnessed all signatures on the form.

<u>WARNING</u>: Every person acting on behalf of a candidate is guilty of a misdemeanor who deliberately fails to file at the proper time and in the proper place any nomination paper in his or her possession which is entitled to be filed under Section 18202 of the Elections Code.

§ 8041

SIGNERS

Signers shall be voters in the district or political subdivision in which the candidate is to be voted on and, if a <u>partisan office</u>, shall be <u>affiliated with the party</u> in which the nomination is proposed. § 8068

A voter may sign both a candidate's nomination papers and his or her in lieu filing fee petition. However, if signatures appearing on such documents are counted towards both the nomination paper and the in lieu filing fee petition signature requirements, a person may only sign one of the documents.

§§ 8061 & 8106(a) (7)

If the office is <u>nonpartisan</u>, any registered voter within the district or political subdivision in which the candidate is to be voted on is eligible to sign the petition.

No signer shall, at the time of signing a certificate, have his or her name signed to any other nomination paper for any other candidate for the same office or, in case there are several offices to be filled in the same office, signed to more nomination papers for candidates for that office than there are places to be filled.

§ 8069

All signers of the same section of a petition must be registered in one county. Different sections must be used in each county where the petitions are circulated and then filed with the County Elections Official in the affected county.

No more signers shall be secured for any candidate than the maximum number required.

§ 8067

A circulator may also be a signer on the petition he/she is circulating, if otherwise qualified.

§ 106

Each voter must sign his/her name in the presence of the circulator and legibly print in the place of residence, giving street and residence number, if any. It is important that the signer, himself/herself, write in the above requirements. Signers are cautioned to give their <u>residence</u> and not their business or mailing address. The circulator must swear to the affidavit appearing at the end of each section of the nomination paper and return all sections to the candidate, who will arrange for filing with the County Elections Official for examination and certification.

§§ 8041, 8063, 8500

Suppression of Nomination papers

Any person who willfully suppresses all or any part of a nomination paper or Declaration of Candidacy either before or after filing is punishable by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000) or by imprisonment in the state prison for 16 months or two or three years or by both the fine and imprisonment.

§ 18204

INDEPENDENT CANDIDATES

Only candidates running as members of one of California's qualified political parties are eligible to participate in the Primary Election process. Thus, the independent nomination provisions of Part 2 of Division 8 of the Elections Code, beginning at Section 8300, were established to provide a method for the nomination of nonpartisan candidates who are not affiliated with a qualified political party to partisan public offices. There is no limitation to the number of independent candidates who can be nominated and placed on the ballot at the General Election, provided each meets the legal requirements.

STATE and FEDERAL CANDIDATES - For information regarding State or Federal Write-In Candidates, refer to the Qualifications information created by the Secretary of State's office. This information is available on the Secretary of State's website at www.sos.ca.gov or at any of the Santa Barbara County Elections Offices.

LOCAL CANDIDATES

Persons who did not file a Declaration of Candidacy and fulfill their nomination requirements to place their name on the ballot may run for an office on the ballot as a write-in candidate.

Filing Period

Primary Election - April 12 – May 25, 2010

General Election - September 6 – October 19, 2010

§ 8601

Write-In Procedure

To qualify as a write-in candidate, a person must file with the County Elections Official the following documents:

A Statement of Write-In Candidacy, which shall contain the candidate's name, complete residence
address, a declaration stating that the candidate is a write-in candidate, the title of the office for which
the candidate is running, if for a partisan office in a Primary Election, the party nomination which the
candidate seeks (a candidate need not be registered with the party whose nomination he/she is
seeking), and the date of the election.

§ 8600

• **Nomination Petition(s)** with the required number of signatures for that office (if any) on the nomination papers. (For partisan offices in the Primary Election: signers must be of the political party whose nomination the write-in candidate is seeking). (There is no party affiliation requirement for signers of write-in nomination petitions in the General Election).

§ 8603

 Any required documentation for the office. (Certain county offices may now require documentation proving qualifications for certain offices. See Elections Code §13.5 and ask your Elections Office).

If there is an insufficient number of nominees who file for an office, that office will not appear on the ballot unless a petition with 10 percent of the voters or 50 voters, whichever is smaller, is submitted requesting that the General District Election be held.

§ 10515

Write-In votes will be counted and certified in the Statement of Vote only for qualified write-in candidates who file the required forms with the County Elections Official no later than 14 days prior to Election Day. The County Elections Official will forward the forms to the Secretary of State in the case of an office that must be certified by the Secretary of State.

Voters may write-in any person they wish for any office regardless of whether the person has qualified or not, however, the <u>votes will only be tabulated for qualified write-in candidates</u>.

Write-in candidates are subject to the same requirements as other candidates with regard to disclosure of economic interests and campaign disclosure.

§§ 82007 G.C. §305 E.C.

The County Elections Official will provide polling places with a list of qualified write-in candidates.

The required numbers of signers to a write-in candidate's nomination paper are the same number required of candidates that filed during the regular candidate filing period (see individual office pages).

In order to be nominated to any partisan office at the Primary Election, the write-in candidate must receive more votes than any other candidate running for that party's nomination, and must also receive votes equal to at least 1% of all votes cast for that office at the last preceding General Election at which the office was filled. (See the end of this section for required number of votes).

§ 8605

No filing fee or charge shall be required of a write-in candidate except in the case of a candidate for city office, as provided in Section 10228 of the Elections Code.

No person whose name has been written in upon a ballot for an office at the direct primary may have his or her name placed upon the ballot as a candidate for that office for the ensuing General Election unless one of the following is applicable:

- (a) At that direct primary he or she received for that office vote's equal in number to 1 percent of all votes cast for the office at the last preceding General Election at which the office was filled.
- (b) He or she is an independent nominee pursuant to Part 2 commencing with Section 8300 of the Elections Code.
- (c) He or she has been designated by a party central committee to fill a vacancy on the ballot for the General Election.

§§ 8600-8605

JUDICIAL WRITE-IN CANDIDATE

If <u>only</u> the incumbent has filed nomination papers for the office of Superior Court Judge for the Primary Election, his or her name shall not appear on the Primary Election ballot unless there is filed with the County Elections Official, within 10 days after the final date for filing nomination papers for the office (**by March 22**, **2010**) a petition indicating that a write-in campaign will be conducted for the office and signed by 100 registered voters qualified to vote with respect to the office.

If a petition indicating that a write-in campaign will be conducted for the office at the General Election, signed by 100 registered voters qualified to vote with respect to the office, is filed with the County Elections Official not less than the 83rd day before the General Election (**August 11, 2010**), the name of the incumbent shall be placed on the General Election ballot even if it has not appeared on the direct Primary Election ballot.

If the name of the incumbent does not appear either on the Primary Election ballot or General Election ballot, the County Elections Official, on the day of the General Election, shall declare the incumbent reelected. Certificates of election specified in Section 15401 or 15504 shall not be issued to a person reelected pursuant to this section before the day of the General Election.

STATEMENT OF ECONOMIC INTERESTS

§§ 87200-87203, 87500 G.C.

Who is Required to File

Candidates and officeholders for the following elective offices and certain appointed positions are required to file a statement (FPPC Form 700) revealing investments, interests in real property and/or income, loans and gifts.

Elected State Offices

Members of the State Legislature

Superior Court Judges

Members of the Board of Supervisors

Elected City Officials (file with City Clerk)

Designated City and County Appointed Officials

WHEN TO FILE

Non-incumbent Candidates:

Each candidate for offices listed above must file a Form 700 when he/she files a Declaration of Candidacy. (Please check the box next to "Candidate" in box number 3 of the Form 700 cover page.)

A "Candidate" Form 700 shall not be required if the candidate has filed, within 60 days prior to the filing of his/her Declaration of Candidacy, a statement for the same jurisdiction pursuant to Secs. 87201, 87202, and 87203 G.C.

Incumbent Candidates:

Incumbent State candidates and Judicial candidates are required to file their Annual Form 700 with their agency by March 1st of each year. Therefore, a "Candidate" 700 will not be required if they have filed their Annual Form 700 timely.

Incumbent Candidates whose Annual Form 700 is due April 1st of each year <u>must file</u> a "Candidate" Form 700 and may also check the annual box to avoid having to file a separate Annual Form 700.

Elected Candidates:

Must also file an Assuming Office Statement (Form 700) within 30 days of assuming office.

Where to File

Form 700 is required to be filed with the County Elections Official where the candidate files his/her Declaration of Candidacy. The County Elections Official shall make and retain a copy and forward the original to the Fair Political Practices Commission.

§ 87500 G.C.

Violation Penalties

Any person who knowingly or willfully violates any provision of this act is guilty of a misdemeanor. Violation of this article is punishable by prosecution, injunction or late penalties.

SECTION 4

BALLOT NAMES AND DESIGNATIONS

BALLOT NAMES AND DESIGNATIONS

NAME ON BALLOT

The candidate's name will be printed on the ballot exactly as it appears on the Declaration of Candidacy. This notation should be recognizable as the name under which the candidate is registered, though the two need not be identical. (Example: A candidate registered as "Jonathan William Smith" may use such variations as "John W. Smith", "John Smith", or "J. William (Bud) Smith"). Nicknames of candidates are permitted on the ballot provided the candidate has declared his or her candidacy or has accepted the nomination under that name.

If a candidate changes his/her name within one year of any election, the new name shall not appear upon the ballot unless the change was made by marriage or decree of court of competent jurisdiction.

§ 13104

No title or degree may appear on the same line on a ballot as a candidate's name.

§ 13106

If a candidate changes his or her name within one year of any election, the new name shall not appear upon the ballot unless the change was made by either of the following.

- (a) Marriage
- (b) Decree of any court of competent jurisdiction

§ 13104

RULES FOR PRINTING CANDIDATES' NAMES ON BALLOTS

Names of candidates shall be printed on the ballot in accordance with the following rules:

Federal and State Candidates

- In the case of statewide candidates, the Secretary of State shall arrange the names of the candidates in accordance with the randomized alphabet as provided for in § 13112 for the First Assembly District. Thereafter, for each succeeding Assembly District, the name appearing first in the last preceding Assembly District shall be placed last, the order of the other names remaining unchanged.

 § 13111(c)
- (2) If the office is that of Representative in Congress or member of the State Board of Equalization, the Secretary of State shall arrange the names of candidates in accordance with the randomized alphabet as provided for in § 13112 for that Assembly District that has the lowest number of all the Assembly Districts in which candidates are to be voted on. Thereafter, for each succeeding Assembly District in which the candidates are to be voted on, the name appearing first in the last preceding Assembly District shall be placed last, the order of the other names remaining unchanged.

 § 13111(d)
- (3) If the office is that of State Senator or Member of the Assembly, the County Elections Official shall conduct a randomized alphabet drawing and arrange the names of the candidates for the office in accordance with the randomized alphabet as provided for in Secs. 13111(i), 13112.

§ 13111(e)

(4) If the office is that of Justice of the California Supreme Court or a court of appeal, the appropriate Elections Officials shall arrange the names of the candidates in accordance with the randomized alphabet as provided for in § 13112. However, the names of the judicial candidates shall not be rotated among the applicable districts.

§ 13111(j)

Local Candidates

(1) If the office is to be voted upon wholly within, but not throughout, one county, as in the case of Municipal, District, County Supervisor, Judge of the Superior Court, and County Central Committee offices, the official responsible for conducting the election shall determine the order of names in accordance with the Secretary of State's randomized alphabet drawing as provided for in § 13112.

§ 13111(f)

(2) If the office is to be voted on throughout a single county, and there are not more than four Assembly Districts wholly or partly in the county, the County Elections Official shall determine the order of names in accordance with the randomized alphabet as provided for in § 13112 for the First Supervisorial District. Thereafter, for each succeeding Supervisorial District, the name appearing first for each office in the last preceding Supervisorial District shall be placed last, the order of the other names remaining unchanged.

§ 13111(g)

RANDOMIZED ALPHABET DRAWING

The Secretary of State shall conduct a drawing of the letters of the alphabet, the result of which shall be known as a randomized alphabet. The procedure shall be as follows:

Each letter of the alphabet shall be written on a separate slip of paper each of which shall be folded and inserted into a capsule. Each capsule shall be opaque and of uniform weight, color, size, shape, and texture. The capsules shall be placed in a container which shall be shaken vigorously in order to mix them thoroughly. The container then shall be opened and the letter on the slip of paper read aloud and written down. The resulting random order of letters constitutes the randomized alphabet which is to be used in the same manner as the conventional alphabet in determining the order of all candidates in all elections. For example, if two candidates with the surnames Campbell and Carlson are running for the same office, their order on the ballot will depend on the order in which the letters M and R were drawn in the randomized alphabet drawing.

§ 13112

BALLOT DESIGNATION

§ 13107 (a) §§ 20710-20719 Cal. Code of Regulations

The ballot designation is the word or group of words that will appear on the ballot under the candidate's name, designating the principal profession, vocation, or occupation of the candidate. Acceptable ballot designations are governed by Elections Code Section 13107. All candidates (except candidates for Justice of the State Supreme Court or Court of Appeal) may choose a ballot designation to appear immediately under his/her name on the ballot.

§ 13107.3(b)

Ballot Designation Worksheet

A Ballot Designation Worksheet will be given to the candidate when picking up nomination papers. This form is required to be completed and returned when filing the Declaration of Candidacy. The completed form shall be public record and shall be available for inspection and copying at the public counter.

§ 13107.3(a)

Please refer to §§ 20710-20719 Cal. Code of Regulations and Elections Code § 13107 (a) for detailed information on ballot designations.

The ballot designation shall remain the same for all purposes of both primary and general elections, unless the candidate, at least 98 days prior to the general election, requests in writing a different designation which the candidate is entitled to use at the time of the request. The written request must be accompanied by a ballot designation worksheet.

§ 13107(e)

SECTION 5

CANDIDATE STATEMENT GUIDELINES

CANDIDATE STATEMENT GUIDELINES

LOCAL CANDIDATES

§ 13107

A candidate for <u>nonpartisan</u> elective office in any local agency may prepare a Candidate's Statement that will be incorporated into the County Sample Ballot Pamphlet and mailed to voters of the appropriate jurisdiction who are registered 29 days or more before the election. The statement must be filed and paid for when the Nomination Papers are filed.

§§ 13307, 13307(a) (1)

ALL OFFICES: In addition to the restrictions set forth in §13307, any candidate's statement submitted pursuant to § 13307 shall be limited to a recitation of the candidate's own personal background and qualifications, and shall not in any way make reference to other candidates for that office or to another candidate's qualifications, character, or activities. The County Elections Official shall not cause to be printed or circulated any statement which the County Elections Official determines is not so limited or that includes any reference prohibited by this section.

§ 13308

County Ordinance 4282 §2 states that candidates for County Supervisor, Auditor-Controller, County Clerk-Recorder-Assessor, District Attorney, Sheriff-Coroner, or Treasurer-Tax Collector-Public Administrator will <u>not be charged</u> for the candidate's statement. This does <u>not include</u> Superior Court Judges.

County Codes Chapter 11B-6

VOLUNTARY CAMPAIGN SPENDING LIMITS*

The voluntary campaign spending limits for County Supervisor are based on one dollar (\$) times one-fifth of the population of the County based on the most recent population figures from the California Department of Finance. All County campaign expenditure limits are adjusted according to the Consumer Price Index in January of every odd-numbered year. The new limits effective January 1, 2009 are:

CONTENTS OF STATEMENT

The Candidate Statement may contain the name, age and occupation of the candidate and a brief description of no more than 200 words of the candidate's education and qualifications expressed by the candidate himself or herself. However, the governing body of the local agency may authorize an increase in the limitations on words for the statement from 200 to 400 words (increasing word count from 200 to 400, may cause cost of the candidate's statement to greatly increase for those candidates choosing the 400 word option).

For non-partisan offices the statement **shall not include** the party affiliation of the candidate, nor membership or activity in partisan political organizations.

§ 13307(a) (1)

^{*}County ordinances are adopted by the County Board of Supervisors and maintained by the Clerk of the Board office. The Elections staff cannot interpret County ordinances. Our obligation as the elections official is to provide the information to potential candidates and other interested persons upon request.

Please refer to the General Candidate Statement Information also.

STATE LEGISLATIVE CANDIDATES

Local Sample Ballot Pamphlet

A candidate for State Senate or Assembly who accepts the voluntary expenditure limits set forth in Section 85400 G.C. may purchase the space to place a statement in the voter information portion of the sample ballot that does not exceed 250 words. The statement may not make any reference to any opponent of the candidate. The statement shall be submitted in accordance with the timeframes and procedures set forth in the Elections Code for the preparation of the voter information portion of the sample ballot.

§ 85601 G.C.

VOLUNTARY CAMPAIGN SPENDING LIMITS

The voluntary campaign spending limits in the Political Reform Act for State offices require that the expenditure limits be adjusted according to the Consumer Price Index in January of every odd-numbered year. The new limits effective January 1, 2009 are:

State Ballot Pamphlet

Candidates for statewide office and the Board of Equalization may purchase space to place a candidate statement in the state ballot pamphlet, provided that their acceptance of the voluntary spending limits has been timely filed with the Secretary of State. Refer to the Secretary of State's calendar for more information. This calendar is available on the Secretary of State's website at www.sos.ca.gov or at all Santa Barbara County Elections Offices. Additionally, the law permits a state candidate to change his/her mind and accept the spending limits for the General Election, if an amended Form 501 is filed within 14 days following the primary, indicating the candidate's intention to accept the spending limits in the general, provided that the filer has not exceeded the spending limits in the Primary. Once the voluntary expenditure limits are accepted (or rejected), the spending-limits decision applies to both the Primary and General Election. However, a state/statewide candidate who has not exceeded the voluntary spending limits no more than two times after the initial filing of the Candidate Intention Statement, provided that the amendment to the filer's Candidate Intention Statement – Form 501 is received by the Secretary of State's office before the deadline for filing the candidate's nomination papers.

GENERAL CANDIDATE STATEMENT INFORMATION

The County Elections Official will send to each voter a voter's pamphlet which contains the sample ballot and a written statement of each candidate that is prepared pursuant to this section.

§ 13307(b)

Notwithstanding the California Public Records Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 6250) of Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government Code), the <u>statements</u> filed pursuant to Section 13307 <u>shall remain confidential until the expiration of the filing deadline</u>.

§ 13311

A copy of each statement will be available for public examination for 10 calendar days immediately following the filing deadline for the filing period. Any person may obtain a copy of the candidate's statements and a fee may be charged for such. During this period any voter of the jurisdiction, or the Registrar of Voters, may seek a writ of mandate or an injunction requiring any or all of the material to be amended or deleted.

§ 13313 (a & b)

Nothing in this section shall be deemed to make any such statement or the authors thereof free or exempt from any civil or criminal action or penalty because of any false, slanderous or libelous statements offered for printing or contained in the voter's pamphlet.

§ 13307 (d)

If a candidate alleges to be indigent and unable to pay in advance the requisite fee for submitting a candidate statement, the candidate may submit a statement of financial worth with his or her candidate statement. If it is determined that the candidate is indigent, the County Elections Official shall print the statement in the sample ballot without charge. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the elections official from billing the candidate his or her actual pro rata share of the cost after the election.

§ 13309

WHEN TO FILE – For Santa Barbara County Sample Ballot Pamphlet

The Candidate's Statement shall be filed and the fee (if any) paid in the office of the County Elections Official when the nomination papers are returned for filing:

§ 13307(a) (2) (c) (e)

PRIMARY: February 16, 2010 and March 12, 2010

(Extended to March 17, 2010 for non-incumbents if incumbent does not file)

State candidates wanting to file in the State Pamphlet must file their candidate statement with the Secretary of State's office by February 17, 2010 for the Primary Election.

GENERAL: July 12, 2010 and August 6, 2010

(Extended to August 11, 2010 for non-incumbents if incumbent does not file)

A nonpartisan candidate may file a candidate's statement for the General Election on or before August 6, 2010. If a statement was filed in the Primary Election, it may either be changed or a new one filed.

The statement may be withdrawn, but not changed, during the period for filing nomination papers and until 5:00 p.m. of the next working day after the close of the nomination period.

§ 13307(3)

FORMAT

Candidates are required to submit their statement in <u>electronic format as well as a hard copy</u>. The electronic statement may be emailed or put on a CD. A CD will be provided by the County Elections Official with the correct form if requested. The statement must be <u>TYPED</u> in **upper** and **lower** case letters, and in **block paragraphs.** The following <u>WILL NOT</u> be permitted:

- Handwritten statement
- Copy from a fax machine
- Extra exclamation points
- Stars, bullets, asterisks, graphics
- Italics

The following is an **EXAMPLE OF AN ACCEPTABLE FORMAT**:

Candidate's Statement of Qualifications

JOHN SMITH Actor/Comedian AGE: 54

FORMAT/CONTENT: This is an example of an acceptable format to be used in a candidate's statement of qualifications. The guidelines for the content of the statement are in this section of the Candidate Filing Guide.

HIGHLIGHTS: It is acceptable for some words or phrases to be **bold** or <u>underlined</u> or <u>bold</u> <u>and</u> <u>underlined</u> to show emphasis. Words may also be in ALL CAPITAL LETTERS or in <u>ANY</u> combination to, again, **show emphasis only**. The beginning of each paragraph may also be highlighted as shown in this example.

PARAGRAPHS: The candidate statement is printed in 'block' paragraphs, which means each paragraph will start on the left and the right margins will be justified (as shown in this example). A double space will appear between paragraphs. Special indentations are not allowed. If a list is to be printed (clubs, accomplishments, goals, etc.), it will appear as shown in the following paragraph:

I belong to the following organizations: PTA...Chamber of Commerce...Zoological Society...Bridge Club. If elected, I will: 1) lower taxes; 2) increase income; 3) cure the common cold; 4) be your faithful servant. If a list is provided in an unacceptable format, the Registrar of Voters staff will make modifications so it conforms to these rules.

Statements will be typeset exactly as submitted; <u>candidates are therefore advised to carefully check their</u> <u>statements for errors in spelling, punctuation and grammar</u>. The County Elections Official is authorized to make corrections only to the format of the statement.

<u>If the County Elections Official's form is not used</u>, candidates may use a computer-generated print of their statement in the following form: **(a copy in electronic format is still required)**

• **BLOCK PARAGRAPHS** on plain white paper (8 1/2" x 11") with MARGINS (both LEFT and RIGHT) of NO LESS than 1/2 inch. A **fixed pitch font** such as COURIER or ARIAL is recommended.

The California Elections Code intends uniformity of appearance of the candidates' statements. By preparing a candidate statement in accordance with the above guidelines, each statement will be uniformly printed and allowed the same amount of space in the Voter Information Pamphlet. This avoids favored composition or printing of one candidate's statement over another.

TRANSLATION: The State requires that each statement be printed in English and Spanish in Santa Barbara County, therefore, the County Elections Official will have all statements translated and the cost will be included in the printing cost.

Before the nominating period opens, the local agency for that election shall determine whether a charge shall be levied against a candidate for the candidate's statement sent to each voter. The decision shall not be revoked or modified after the seventh day prior to the opening of the nominating period.

The County Elections Official will estimate the total cost of the Candidates' Statements and will require each candidate filing a statement to pay, in advance, his or her estimated pro rata share as a condition of having his/her statement included in the voter's pamphlet.

Estimates will be based upon printing costs, the number of sample ballot pamphlets printed for each ballot type, the number of candidates sharing each part change, and the number of voters registered in the applicable district in the last report to the Secretary of State prior to the close of candidate filing.

<u>Please note that these estimates are based on one (1)* candidate statement for each office. Should two or more candidate statements be printed the cost could be significantly less than the amount listed.</u>

The County Elections Official is not bound by the estimate and may, on a pro rata basis, bill the candidate for additional actual expense or refund any excess paid depending on the final actual cost.

§ 13307(c)

Candidates are reminded that when the estimate is determined, the final number of candidates and the number of sample ballots to be printed are unknown. **Therefore, the amount paid at the time of filing should not** be considered as payment in full. In case of underpayment, candidates will be billed the remaining share of the costs by the County Elections Official. In the event of overpayment, the County Elections Official will refund the excess amount within thirty (30) days of the election.

CANDIDATE STATEMENT OVERLAPPING COUNTY SAMPLE BALLOT PAMPHLET

If you wish to have your candidate statement printed in the Sample Ballot Pamphlet of an overlapping county in addition to Santa Barbara County's, you may contact that county or file it with the Santa Barbara County Elections Office. A separate fee will be charged based on the other county's costs.

CANDIDATE STATEMENT NON-PARTISAN SAMPLE BALLOT PAMPHLET

If you are affiliated with a political party that has allowed non-partisan voters to vote that party's ballot and you wish to have your candidate statement printed in the Non-Partisan Sample Ballot Pamphlet there will be an additional charge. Please request information from the Elections Office.

The following shall apply to the counting of words:

- 1. The title and signatures are not counted only the text is counted.
- 2. Punctuation is not counted.
- 3. Each word shall be counted as one word except as specified in this section.
- All geographical names shall be considered as one word; for example, "County of Santa Barbara" shall be counted as one word.
- 5. Each abbreviation for a word, phrase, or expression shall be counted as one word.
- 6. Hyphenated words that appear in any generally available standard reference dictionary, published in the United States at any time within the 10 calendar years immediately preceding the election for which the words are counted, shall be considered as one word. Each part of all other hyphenated words shall be counted as a separate word.
- Dates consisting of a combination of words and digits shall be counted as two words; for example January 8, 2009 would count as two words. Dates consisting only of a combination of digits shall be counted as one word; for example 1/8/09 would count as one word.
- 8. Any number consisting of a digit or digits shall be considered as one word. Any number which is spelled, such as "one", shall be considered as a separate word or words. "One" shall be counted as one word whereas "one hundred" shall be counted as two words. "100" shall be counted as one word

This section shall <u>not</u> apply to counting words for ballot designations under Elections Code Section 13107.

CAMPAIGN FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE

CAMPAIGN FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE

OVERVIEW

The Political Reform Act of 1974, as amended, requires all candidates for elective office, all elected officeholders, and all committees supporting or opposing candidates, measures, and petition circulation drives to file campaign disclosure statements disclosing contributions received and expenditures made.

§§ 84100 - 84108 G.C.

The Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) provides the Registrar of Voters with an Information Manual for candidates and committees. Candidates and/or committee treasurers should obtain the manual as soon as possible and make certain that all persons involved in the financial aspect of the campaign are fully aware of their responsibilities under the law (Gov. Code 81010, 93113). Candidates and/or their treasurers are responsible for reading the Campaign Disclosure Manual and complying with applicable rules and regulations. Manuals are available from the FPPC website at www.fppc.ca.gov and at Elections Offices.

Any technical questions regarding Campaign Disclosure should be directed to a technical consultant with the FPPC at (916) 322-5660 or toll free at (866) ASK-FPPC. Information and forms may be obtained from the FPPC web site as well (www.fppc.ca.gov).

For additional detailed information relating to California reporting requirements of the Political Reform Act of 1974, as amended, see Government Code §§ 81000 through 91014 or contact the FPPC.

Campaign disclosure filings are a public record. All statements filed under the disclosure law are a matter of public record. They may be inspected by anyone, and copies may be purchased at 10 cents per page.

The <u>California Secretary of State</u> issues ID numbers to campaigns and committees, registers lobbyists, receives campaign and lobbying disclosure reports, provides technical assistance to filers, and maintains disclosure reports for public access. 

Sec. 35-4. Prohibited signs.

The following signs are prohibited in all districts within the unincorporated area of the county:

- 1. Animated signs.
- 2. Roof signs.
- 3. Projecting signs, except as specifically permitted by this article for symbols with or without words—See paragraph (6) of section 35-17, paragraph (5) of section 38-18, and paragraph (1) of section 35-19.
- 4. Marquee signs.
- 5. Portable signs.
- 6. More than one freestanding sign for any enterprise, except as specifically permitted by this article.
- 7. Changeable copy and multiple copy signs, except as specifically permitted by this article in:
 - Commercial, heavy commercial, industrial and heavy industrial districts for freestanding signs.
 - b. Commercial, heavy commercial, industrial and heavy industrial districts for wall signs for certain places of public entertainment.
 - c. Service stations in shopping centers.
 - d. Church changeable copy signs.
- 8. Political signs, except as they would be permitted as on-premise or off-premise signs for any nonpolitical enterprise.
